(i) **Township of Hudson re: Support for Fire Departments**

WHEREAS the role of Ontario's 441 fire departments and their approximate 30,000 full, part-time and volunteer firefighters is to protect Ontarians and their property;

AND WHEREAS according to the Ontario Fire Marshal and Emergency Management's latest data, in Ontario there was over 11,000 loss fires; 9,500 no loss fires; 784 injuries; 91 fatalities; and over \$820 million dollars of estimated loss in 2018;

AND WHEREAS fire emergencies make up only a portion of the total calls for help received by fire and emergency service departments as they respond to nearly every public emergency, disaster or 9-1-1 call;

AND WHEREAS Ontario's fire department infrastructure deficit continues to grow annually and is almost entirely borne by the municipality and local taxpayers with the majority having populations under 25,000;

AND WHEREAS due to antiquated structures and equipment that do not meet current industry standards, the safety of the Ontario public and Ontario firefighters, is being jeopardized;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Kearney requests:

THAT the Federal and Provincial Government include apparatuses, training, equipment and structures for fire departments as eligible categories to any further infrastructure programs which will not only provide immediate stimulus to the local, provincial and federal economies given current economic uncertainty but also ensure the safety of Canadians and dedicated firefighters; and

THAT this Resolution be forwarded to the Honourable Doug Ford, Premier of Ontario; the Honourable Steve Clark, Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing; the Honourable Laurie Scott, Minister of Infrastructure; our local MP and MPP; Jon Pegg, Ontario Fire Marshal; and the Ontario Association of Fire Chiefs. **CARRIED**

(ii) **North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit re: Public Health Funding for 2022**

WHEREAS the Government of Ontario in its budget of April 11, 2019, initiated a Public Health Modernization process which included a change in municipal cost-sharing from 25% of mandatory public health programs covered by municipalities to 30% of almost all public health programs based on 2018 third quarter spending levels;

AND WHEREAS on August 21, 2020, the Ministry of Health (Ministry) announced that provincial mitigation funding would be provided to offset the increase to municipal cost-sharing for 2020 and 2021;

AND WHEREAS the COVID-19 pandemic, which started in early 2020, has further affected municipalities' ability to pay levy increases, has stalled modernization processes, has increased the cost-of-living, and has affected the health and well-being of the public, and more specifically, public health clients and staff;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Kearney supports the Board of Health for the North Bay Parry Sound District Health Unit in their position to return to the 2018 cost-sharing formulas at 25%/75%, with 100% provincially funded programs;

AND FURTHER that Council supports continuing mitigation funding for 2022 to eliminate the additional financial burden of a 42-50% levy increase to the Health Unit's 31 member municipalities if it is not possible to return to the 2018 cost-sharing formula with 100% provincially funded programs;

AND FURTHER that Council supports the request for the 2022 public health funding to include increases to reflect cost-of-living increases, public health program changes related to ongoing COVID-19 response, and funding to assist with program and community recovery efforts;

AND FURTHER that Council supports the Board of Health's request for a base funding increase to fund an Associate Medical Officer of Health to support the Medical Office of Health with the continual demands of 24/7 on call coverage that has been highlighted throughout the COVID-19 pandemic;

AND FURTHER that Council supports a letter being sent to the Minister of Health from our Board of Health detailing the financial and organizational pressures on public health, including outlining the urgency for establishing the funding levels for 2022 to assist public health and community budget planning. **CARRIED**

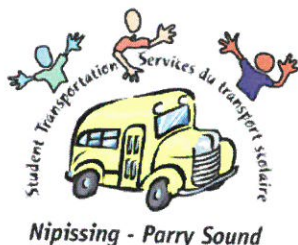

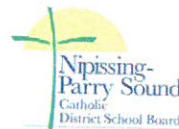

**THIS AGREEMENT MADE AS OF THE 1ST DAY OF SEPTEMBER, 2021,
BETWEEN
THE TOWN OF KEARNEY
(Hereafter referred to as the "Town")**

-and-

**NIPISSING-PARRY SOUND STUDENT TRANSPORTATION SERVICES
(Hereinafter referred to as the "Consortium")**

WHEREAS the Consortium has a need for school bus transfer sites;

AND WHEREAS the parties wish to enter into an agreement for the provision of a school bus transfer site;

NOW THEREFORE in consideration of the foregoing background, the covenants of this Agreement and other good and valuable consideration (the receipt and adequacy of which we hereby acknowledge), the parties agree as follows:

1.0 The Service

1.1. This agreement will be for a three (3) year term commencing September 1, 2021 to August 31, 2024, inclusive.

2.0 School Bus Transfer Locations

2.1. In providing school bus services, the Consortium has a need for transfer sites in order to allow students to transfer to different school buses. The Town agrees to allow the Consortium to use the parking lot at the Kearney Community Centre for such purposes.

2.2. Transfers will normally take place twice a day on all school days at approximately 7:50 am and 3:40 pm; and take about 10 to 15 minutes to complete.

3.0 Insurance Indemnity

3.1. The Consortium shall indemnify and save harmless the Town from any claim or demand arising from the use of the parking lot by the Consortium and against all losses, damages, costs, charges, and expenses the Town may incur the permission in Paragraph 2.

3.2. The Consortium agrees to provide and maintain third party comprehensive liability insurance in the amount of not less than five million dollars (\$5,000,000) per occurrence, to include;

- i) The Town of Kearney as an additional insured;
- ii) Cross liability clause; and
- iii) Thirty (30) day written notice of cancelation, termination, or material change.

The Consortium will provide the Town with a valid Certificate of Insurance that confirms the above requirements and a copy of any replacement certificates as may be necessary.

4.0 Dispute Resolution

4.1. Any dispute where an agreement cannot be reached, this Agreement shall be settled in arbitration according to the Arbitration Act.

5.0 Termination

- 5.1. Any party may terminate this Agreement upon giving the other party three (3) months written notice of intention to terminate.

6.0 General Provisions

6.1. Entire Agreement

This Agreement constitutes the entire Agreement and understanding of the parties relating to the subject matter of this Agreement and supersedes all prior understandings, discussions, negotiations, commitments, warranties and agreements, written or oral, express or implied between them.

6.2. Notices, etc.

- i) Any demand, notice, direction or other communications to be made or given hereunder (in each case, "Communication") shall be in writing and may be made or given by personal delivery, by courier, by transmittal, by telecopy or other similar means of electronic communications, or sent by registered mail, charges prepaid, addressed to the respective parties as follows:

or such other address or telecopy number any party may from time to time notify the other in accordance with this section.

- ii) Any Communication made by personal delivery or by courier shall be conclusively deemed to have been given and received on the day of actual delivery thereof, or, if made or given by telecopy or other electronic means of communication, on the first Business Day following the transmittal thereof. Any Communication that is mailed shall be conclusively deemed to have been given and received on the fifth Business Day following the date of mailing but if, at the time of mailing or within five Business Days thereafter, there is or occurs a labour dispute or other event that might reasonable be expected to disrupt delivery of documents by mail, then any Communication shall be delivered or transmitted by means of courier or recorded electronic communication as provided for in this section and as the circumstance may dictate.

- iii) "Business Day" means any day other than Saturday, Sunday or a Statutory civil, observed holiday in the province of Ontario.

6.3. Serviceability

If any term or other provision of this Agreement is invalid, illegal or incapable of being enforced by any applicable law or public policy, all other conditions and provisions of this Agreement shall nevertheless remain in full force and effect so long as the economic or legal substance of the transactions contemplated hereby are not affected in any manner materially adverse to any party,

6.4. Governing Law

This Agreement shall be governed by, and construed and enforced in accordance with, the laws of the Province of Ontario and the federal laws of Canada applicable therein. Each party hereby irrevocable and unconditionally submits to the nonexclusive jurisdiction of the courts of such province and all courts competent to hear appeals therefrom.

6.5. Further Assurances

Each party shall at all times and from time to time, upon each request by the other party, execute and deliver such further documents and do such further acts and things as the other party may reasonable request to evidence, carry out and give full effect to the terms , conditions, intent and meaning of this Agreement.

6.6. Non-Assignability

A party may not assign or transfer this Agreement, or any right under this Agreement, either in whole or in part without the prior written consent all other parties, which consent may be unreasonably and arbitrarily withheld. Subject to this restriction, this Agreement shall ensure to the benefit of, and bind, the parties and their respective successors and assigns.

6.7. Headings

The headings are for convenience of reference only and do not form part of the Agreement and are not intended, define or limit the scope, extent or intent of this Agreement or any previsions thereof.

Recommendation

Received for Information purposes, and provide direction proceedings.

Summary

The By-Law department has received multiple complaints/concerns on back yard chickens and roosters located in different areas through out the Town.

A few of the common concerns noted with these types of complaints/concerns are the noise created from roosters, zoning- permitted uses, and as well as the amount of poultry birds one would be permitted on specific sized lots.

Roosters do create a fair amount of untimely noise...ie: 0300am but are currently exempt from our noise bylaw if being used for agricultural. Roosters will make more noise when it feels its territory is threatened by a neighbouring rooster or other animals.

With complaints and concerns rising, the By-law department is seeking direction on how the Town would like to proceed with these matters.

There are a few townships, some neighbouring, that have bylaws prohibiting the keeping and use of poultry altogether, some that permit them outside of “in-town” limits, and others that restrict the keeping of roosters and limit the number of hens permitted per property.

Some definitions and regulations in neighbouring townships for backyard chickens and or roosters are:

-BACKYARD CHICKEN means the accessory keeping of a maximum of four (4) hens for the purposes of companionship as a pet or for providing food for personal consumption of occupants of the dwelling on the same lot; and does not include farm, or agricultural uses otherwise defined by the Townships Zoning By-law

-2.2 The keeping of roosters is prohibited.

-There is a \$30.00 annual fee per household. The permit covers up to four chickens.

- The keeping of hens shall be restricted to properties that have a minimum of 0.4 hectares (one acre).
 - A maximum of six (6) hens shall be permitted.
 - An enclosure for keeping one or more hens:
 - Shall be located at least 3.0 metres from the side lot and at least 1.2 metres from the rear lot line of the lot on which the hen coop is located.
 - Shall be located at least 3.0 metres from abutting dwellings.
 - Must be at least 7.5 metres from any church or school.
 - Shall contain an enclosed roof structure and shall not be greater than 3.0 metres by 3.0 metres and no greater than 4.5 metres in height.
 - Shall only be located in the rear yard.
-
- The license fee for a hen coop is in accordance with By-Law 2005-10 which is renewable each calendar year (on or before December 31) with the Licensing Department and registered in the identification system.
 - A maximum of 6 hens are permitted on any residential property.
 - All hens must be at least 4 months old.
 - The keeping of roosters is prohibited.
 - A tenant must obtain permission from the property owner to keep hens on the owner's property.
 - The owner of the hens must reside on the property where the hens are kept.
 - Applicants must advise their neighbours of their intention to obtain a hen coop permit prior to submitting application.
 - Hens must be kept in their coops from 9:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.
 - Hens must be kept in an enclosed hen run when not in their coop.
 - Hen coops and hen runs shall be a minimum distance of 3 m from all windows and doors of dwellings that are located on an abutting property.
 - Hen coops are not permitted in any front or side yard
 - Hen coops and hen runs shall be maintained in a clean condition and the coop shall be kept free of obnoxious odours, substances and vermin.

On January 7, 2020, comments from the Simcoe Muskoka District Health Unit (SMDHU) related to backyard chickens as follows: "...In general, public health concerns resulting from urban chickens are similar to those hazards that are associated with having domestic animals. According to research, the risk of pathogen transmission from backyard chickens appears to be low and does not present a threat to the public's health. It is comparable to keeping other animals allowed by similar bylaws such as dogs and cats. Adherence to proper hygiene (e.g. hand washing, maintaining and regularly cleaning chicken coops) will significantly mitigate the risk of disease acquisition which are commonly found in chickens, including Salmonella. Regular maintenance will also assist with some of the nuisance-related issues that are associated with backyard chickens including attraction of pests (rodents, raccoons, flies to animal feces or animal feed products) and odours (associated with animal waste). In order to prevent nuisance issues, animal caretakers should be required to ensure proper disposal of waste (e.g. animal feces) and dead animals, limit the number of chickens in structures, and keep structures (chicken coops) tight to avoid pest interaction with feed and odours. The poor location of a chicken coop could

potentially impact the ground water and well heads both on and off the property depending on the physical location of the coop and animal waste storage. It is important proper clearance distances from wells and water courses are adhered to...”

The common limitations are 4-6 hens and no roosters always located in the backyard not the side or front. Attached is some FAQ sheets and a licensing application example.

Backyard Chicken Considerations:

Three major criteria remain problematic in the case of backyard chickens:

- ensuring public health and safety;
- ensuring keeping of hens will not cause public nuisance problems; and,
- animal care and welfare needs can be reasonably met.

- Noise Complaints:
 - Chickens produce around 60-70 decibels of noise, compared to a dog bark which is around 90 decibels.
- Predation:
 - Backyard hens are especially vulnerable to predation and can be easy targets for dogs, foxes, cats, weasels, skunks, raccoons, coyotes, snakes, opossums, birds of prey (such as hawks and owls), and other predators (even rats). They are not able to fly and cannot fight back against a predator’s attack.
 - Additionally, uncollected eggs are an attractant for predators and rodents, especially in the winter. Raccoons, snakes, and cats love to eat eggs.
- Range Habits:
 - Chickens are natural foragers, whose diet consists of grains, insects, grit, etc. which has a detrimental effect on softscapes of yards (grass, plants, bushes, etc.).
- Fecal Matter/Odours:
 - Chickens produce a large amount of waste (approximately one-pound of manure a month), and all that waste can cause backyard odours. Weather (rain and heat) have an impact on the amount of odour, which can be stronger in summer months.
 - Fresh manure is not good for plants or the compost heap. Only rain and cold weather will breakdown the harmful acids in their waste products, so having somewhere to dispose of it safely is key.
 - Daily cleaning of coop is required.
 - Can attract flies and other insects during warm weather.
 - Salmonella, Campylobacter, and E.coli bacteria can be found in poultry droppings eggs, and on their bodies, as well as their housing materials and immediate environment (plants, soil, etc.). These bacteria can transmit from poultry/environment to humans and can cause gastrointestinal illness, especially in groups of people at higher risk (young children, elderly persons, individuals with compromised immune systems).

- Husbandry:
 - Adequate space is required for proper welfare of hens. A minimum of 2 to 3 square feet of space within your hen house and up to 10 feet per chicken outside. Space prevents overcrowding and associated problems such as stress, bullying and disease.
 - Housing requirements for weather changes with appropriate air exchange/ventilation during all seasons to remove ammonia generated by manure). A properly insulated building that will provide protection from the elements is required, with enough heat to keep the birds comfortable.
 - Proper secure food storage to prevent rodent infestations.
- Lifespan:
 - Chickens typically live for 5-8 years but can for much longer. Egg production declines rapidly year over year, and by years 3-4 egg production may have fallen by as much as 50% or more. This means that they will not be productive for their final years but will still need same level of care.
- Veterinary Care:
 - It may be difficult to find local specialized care for chickens.
 - Chickens can be prone to parasites, such as lice and mites, especially if not provided with dust baths.
 - Salmonella and Campylobacter (bacteria) can be a concern.
 - Disposal of dead stock is regulated by [OMAFRA](#).
- Allergens:
 - The dander and dust created by birds is an allergen and it can occasionally causes reactions in people.
 - Many people raise chicks inside their house until they are big enough to go outside - the amount of dust created is huge and anyone suffering from asthma or similar ailments will be highly stressed.
- Back-up Plan:
 - Alternate care provider required for any absences from the home.
 - Eggs must be collected daily.
- Roosters:
 - There's about a 5 percent chance that your hen will turn out to be a rooster, since the gender of a chicken is hard to identify upon birth, even for experts, and they end up being shipped by error to feed stores.
- Cost of Ownership:
 - It's cheaper to purchase eggs than to keep hens.
- Public Health Concerns:
 - Illnesses and outbreaks are linked to exposure to backyard chickens. May be due to lack of owner awareness, as well as perception of backyard poultry as pets (ie. kissing and snuggling).

We have had two medical calls and nine fire calls.

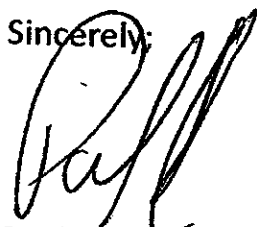
New recruits are fitting in well.

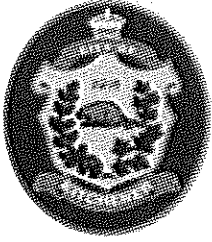

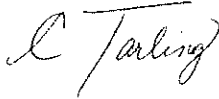

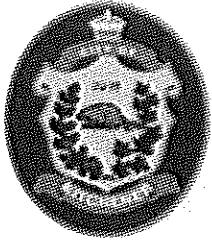

WHEREAS the Province of Ontario has deemed residential construction as essential activity during province-wide emergency declarations and stay-at-home orders; and,

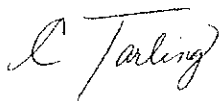
WHEREAS Kitchener City Council considers it a matter of public interest as the increase in rates and demand could result in unsustainable costs on the local construction industry;

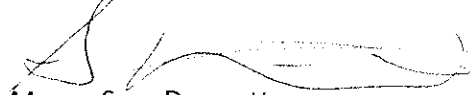
